Described as the “emerging civic visionary” in an article by the Isthmus last year, Dr. Sonya

Newenhouse, president of the Madison Environmental Group, Inc., will be our guest speaker next Wednesday, February 1st at the Inn on the Park.

Newenhouse is one of a new breed of eco-entrepreneurs who has made a business out of helping consumers and companies do better for the environment. She will speak to us about how all of us can help the City of Madison and environs become “green” in terms of building eco-friendly buildings and cutting down on garbage and the use of energy and cars.

Newenhouse started Madison Environmental Group, Inc. in 1998 with one other employee “to

blend business and the environment.” Now the firm has nine workers and annual sales of just under \$1 million that are growing at 20 percent each year. This creative consulting firm works with individuals and organizations to improve communities and the environment.

Sonya Newenhouse received her PhD degree from the UW-Madison, Nelson Institute for Environmental Studies in 1997. Madison Environmental Group, Inc. received the Wisconsin Partnership for Clean Air Award in 2003 and a Dane County Small Business Award in 2004. Newenhouse was recently awarded a two year national fellowship with the Environmental Leadership Program. She serves on three committees for the Mayor of Madison, chairing the Solid Waste Advisory Committee.

Madison Environmental Group, Inc. was instrumental in working with J.H. Findorff & Son to recover 80% of the construction waste stream during construction of the Overture Center for the Arts.

Of Newenhouse and her team, one Madison company said, “They’re very passionate about what they do also very educated and realistic about it. I think they truly understand that this is a process of educating people and slowly changing behavior.”

Madison Rep will Inaugurate New Home with Theatrical Classic by Madison Native

Emily: “Do human beings ever realize life while they live it?—every, every minute?”

Stage Manager: “No. Saints and poets maybe—they do some.”

These words from the play “Our Town” demonstrate the simple, yet profound language and message created by Thornton Wilder, a native of Madison and one of the most important playwrights in the history of American theater. His classic work will be performed as Madison Repertory Theatre’s inaugural production in their new home, The Playhouse at the Overture Center, February 17-March 12. Noted Broadway actor Andre de Shields, a graduate of the UW-Madison (1970) and a veteran of Madison Rep’s stage during his time in Madison, will star as the Stage Manager, the narrator and sage of the play.

Madison Rep Artistic Director Richard Corley and Managing Director Elizabeth Faddell went before the Rotary Club on January 25th to talk about “Our Town,” Wilder, their new home, The Playhouse, and The Rep’s mission and vision to

serve the community with theatrical honesty and integrity.

Thornton Wilder was born in Madison and lived here until he was 7 years old. His father was editor and part-owner of the Wisconsin State Journal. All the members of the Wilder family—Thornton in particular -- were known for their intellectual curiosity, spirituality, and imagination.

Rick Corley noted that “Our Town” is a play that “everyone seems to know,” whether one has actually seen it or not. Wilder’s play is a radical, insightful look at the blundering path most humans take as they go through life. First produced 70 years ago, “Our Town” has helped millions of theater-goers look at the world, and the people who inhabit it, in a new light. He mentioned the multi-cultural casting of this production that would illuminate the play and its message in exciting ways, saying that the production would help people see and hear it with fresh eyes and ears.

MRF Scholarship Fund Gifts

Laura Peck, President of the Madison Rotary Foundation this year, announced during our January 25th Rotary luncheon three recent additions to our Foundation's Endowment Funds:

A year ago, a new **Wilson Scholarship Fund** was established by Mike and Pat Wilson. This is in addition to a named Wilson Youth Award that was set-up in 2003 by the Wilson's. Mike and Pat recently added \$2,000 each to these two endowment funds to recognize and assist youth in our community.

Nate Brand established a scholarship fund within our Foundation three years ago, and last month, he contributed an additional \$25,000 to the **Nathan F. Brand Scholarship Fund**. With this new gift, the total giving to this fund is \$125,000 and will further expand the support of this named scholarship fund in the coming years.

Also in December, the **Irving and Dorothy Levy Family Foundation** added a \$30,000 gift to their family's named scholarship fund within our Foundation, bringing the total endowment giving to \$130,000. This will expand the scholarship they offer to qualified local students.

Our Scholarship and Youth Award Committees are beginning their work in selecting the 2006 recipients, and we look forward to introducing you to students selected for these expanded scholarships and youth awards in May.

It is with sincere appreciation that we thank Mike and Pat Wilson, Nate Brand and the Irving and Dorothy Levy Family Foundation for their continuing generosity, an investment in the young people in our community.

Elizabeth Fadell spoke about the exciting changes of the old Isthmus Playhouse into the new Playhouse. She remarked that, even after the extensive restoration, the theater is still an intimate 350-seat proscenium theatre, and listed the many new and exciting features of The Playhouse that will be sure to thrill Madison theater-goers:

- * A beautiful new color scheme throughout the theater
- * More comfortable seating arrangement (eliciting a round of applause from the assembled Rotarians)
- * A larger proscenium and a bigger "playing space" for the performances

The Playhouse's opening celebration will take place the weekend of February 17-18, featuring performances of "Our Town," discussion sessions with noted Wilder scholars, champagne toasts, and backstage tours. The final two plays of the season are "Having Our Say" and "The Price"; season tickets for a package of "Our Town" and these two plays are still available.

Madison Rep will announce its 2006-2007 season in mid-April. The upcoming season will feature a mix of new and classic dramas and comedies, a new musical, and the annual Madison New Play Festival -- a chance for theater audiences to get into the creative process with new and emerging works.
